

Therefore, we are enhancing our communications efforts to reach deeper into the community. We have built strong content on the Loving Houston website (lovinghouston.net), reached out to school districts and community leaders using Facebook and Twitter, and produced excellent videos that demonstrate the tremendous impact of church-school partnerships.

We have also continued to connect with individuals, school districts, churches, denominations, and key nonprofits such as Children At Risk, the Barbara Bush Houston Literacy Foundation, and Kids Hope USA using the most effective communication medium of all: personal contact and relationship-building.

As word about Loving Houston spreads, we are receiving increasing numbers of calls from school districts, church networks, and church denominations that want to get involved. More than 30 of these groups have expressed interest already in special presentations of our Equipping Session, and we foresee that this demand will continue to grow as more churches join the movement.



JIMMY'S STORY

"What are your fears?"

"The STAAR test. I don't know
my 9s and 12s."

There aren't many certain things in life, but Jimmy's teachers were certain that Jimmy would fail his STAAR test every year. This year, it would be because he didn't know how to multiply his 9s and 12s.

Jimmy's mentor Susan was determined to put a stop to this.

"Do you have flash cards, Jimmy?"

You see, mentors weren't allowed to give gifts, but they were allowed to make crafts! Susan and Jimmy faithfully flipped through those flash cards each week, cards that got grimier and more dog-eared with each passing day.

And then the week of the STAAR test arrived.

After the test, each teacher was handed the papers of students who had failed. Jimmy's teacher was certain that she was missing one paper – Jimmy's. But it wasn't a mistake. Those flash cards (and much prayer from Susan!) had paid off. Jimmy had finally passed!



Michael's parents were divorced. His mom had moved out to Las Vegas, and his dad was never around, working around the clock to provide for his family. Since Michael's dad provided for Michael financially but wasn't able to be there physically, he wanted his son to have a mentor.

Michael had been making As and Bs. Bruce told him he needed to make all As so that he could get into college. Michael honored that commitment. In fact, after making straight As all through high school, Michael graduated with honors and received a full 4-year scholarship to Texas A&M!

Michael shared this via Skype at the 2015

Spring Branch ISD Good Neighbor Celebration:

"I'm here because of my mentor, Bruce... I probably would not be at Texas A&M without him." He thanked the gathered Good Neighbors "for taking time out of your busy schedule to spend some time with a kid."

"You never know what kind of impact you will have,"

the business major told the gathering. He spoke about his future, saying, "I'm going to be a mentor. You can't be blessed like me, and not give it back." ¹

There are thousands of kids like Jimmy across Greater Houston who want to know that someone believes in them. Someone who will ask them about their fears and take a few minutes to make flash cards.

There are also thousands of kids like Michael. Kids who feel the void left by busy or absent parents. Kids who long for a caring adult to spend time with them and to believe in them.

And there are thousands of men and women like Susan and Bruce who want to give of their time and resources but just don't know how to get started.

The 4,000 CHURCHES in Greater Houston have an extraordinary opportunity to provide a workforce for service in our communities, and Loving Houston has been turning this opportunity into a reality.

Loving Houston celebrates, recognizes, and promotes the good already being done by local churches, and engages more churches in the work of community transformation.

Our method is simple: We equip churches to meet real human needs in practical, hands-on ways.

FOCUS AND FRUIT

Loving Houston's leaders realized that with the many needs and opportunities in our communities, focus was needed. After studying CityServe's School Partnership Network in Portland, Oregon, and talking with Dr. Stephen Klineberg of the Rice University Kinder Institute for Urban Research, Loving Houston committed to helping churches serve local schools.

Church-school partnerships allow children to develop sustained relationships with caring adults who offer much-needed emotional and academic support for success in school and beyond. Churches can also support teachers and engage parents, empowering and encouraging them as we work together for the flourishing of our kids and communities.

The Luis Palau Association brought CityFest to Houston, introducing the CityServe model of convening church, business, and civic leaders for the benefit of the city

2013

Union Baptist Association deployed 2,000 volunteers from 75 local churches to renovate homes, complete beautification projects, and distribute basic resources in neighborhoods across Houston
